9. Historical significance (include explanation of themes checked above)

Built as part of the McFarland-Chamberlain Farm which was subdivided to create Richmond Heights around 1896, the Gabriel House is an unusually fine example of Colonial Revival architecture. The house's rectangular plan, hip roof, Ionic pilasters and dormers are characteristic elements of Colonial Revival design. Other, less usual features include a second storey bowed criel with Palladian window (2nd storey facade), splayed window lintels with keystones, and Ionic porches with original balustrades. Currently in excellent condition, the Gabriel House stands out as one of the earliest and finest houses in the Richmond Heights area.

The house's first occupant was George Gabriel, a bookkeeper and later manager of the George Blake Company, dealers iniron, steel and other metals. Gabriel's move here in 1899, from a house at 8 Melville Stree which he had built in 1891, is characteristic of the change in residential patterns which occurred in the nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. While earlier, Victorian middle and upper-class areas had existed on all sides of the center city, by the 1880s districts north, east and south of the business district were being by-passed in favor of the city's west side, particularly such areas as the former Lincoln Estate (Form 116-LO, Hammond Heights (Form 101-B) and later Richmond Heights.
